# Report to General Synod Burlington 2010

13 Esteemed brothers in the Lord,

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15 The Board of Governors of the Theological College of the Canadian Reformed Churches

16 hereby submits to your assembly, in accordance with section 6 (1) of the Canadian

17 Reformed Theological College Act (1981) (the "College Act"), a report of its work and

18 decisions since the last General Synod held in May, 2007 (Synod 2007).

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# 20 Board of Governors

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Synod 2007 appointed to the Board Mr. A. Bax, Mr. H. Kampen and Rev. A.J. Pol. At the 22 meeting of September 6, 2007, letters of acceptance were received from these three 23 brothers and they subsequently signed the "Declaration of Governors" as found in By-law 24 12 as well as the "Statement of Compliance" as found in the Handbook of the Theological 25 College. 26 27 Since Synod 2007, the Board of Governors has met seven times. The meetings took place 28 in Hamilton, in the facilities of the College on September 6, 2007, January 24, 2008, April 29 21, 2008, September 4, 2008, Dec. 11<sup>th</sup>, 2008, January 29, 2009 and September 10, 2009. 30 Another meeting is planned for January of 2010. Minutes of these meetings of the Board 31 are available for consultation by members of Synod 2010. All Board members were able to 32 attend every meeting 33 34 35 In December, 2007, Rev. G. Ph. VanPopta submitted a letter of resignation which was

accepted by the Board. The Board wishes to acknowledge the work of Rev. VanPopta

during his time on the Board. Invited to take the place of Rev. VanPopta was Rev. E.

38 Kampen, the first alternate for Regional Synod East as appointed by Synod 2007. At a

39 subsequent meeting, Rev. Kampen also signed the "Declaration of Governors" and the 40 "Statement of Compliance."

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42 The following brothers have completed their term as Board members: Dr. G. Nederveen,

- 43 Mr. G. Nordeman and Rev. R. Schouten. The Board would like to express its gratitude for
- the work done by these brothers during the last nine years. The Board is submitting a
- 45 proposal to Synod to fill the vacancy in the Finance and Property Committee. Synod will

- 46 receive background information regarding the qualifications of these brothers.
- 47 Recommendations to fill the ministerial vacancies may be expected from Regional Synod

48 West 2009 and Regional Synod East 2009.

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# 50 Senate and Faculty

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### 52 *Retired faculty*

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During the last three years, the retired Professor of New Testament, Prof. J. Geertsema, 54 continued to function as part of the Senate. His ability to attend meetings was sometimes 55 hindered because of the illness of his wife. In November of 2007, sr. Geertsema was 56 struck by a severe bacterial infection which has had permanent effects. On Dec. 15, 2008, 57 Prof. and Mrs. Geertsema were able to celebrate his 45<sup>th</sup> anniversary in the Ministry of the 58 59 Word. Dr. J. DeJong remains on permanent disability and has suffered a further decline of health during the last three years and is now being cared for in Shalom Manor in 60 Grimsby, Ontario. In addition, sr. K. Deddens, widow of Dr. K. Deddens, has been 61 dealing with cancer. We commend Dr. and Mrs. DeJong and their family, as well as Prof. 62 and Mrs. J. Geertsema and Mrs. Deddens to the care of God and request the continued 63

- 64 prayers of the churches for these individuals.
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Faculty milestones

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In May of 2008, Dr. G.H. Visscher successfully defended his doctoral dissertation at
 McMaster University and was award the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. In October of

McMaster University and was award the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. In October o 2009, the Rev. J. VanVliet was awarded the Th. D. degree from the Theologische

- 71 Universiteit Apeldoorn. We congratulate these faculty members upon reaching these
- scholarly milestones which are significant for them personally but also very beneficial for
- the well-being of the College and the supporting churches. The Board is thankful for the
- continued studies and academic achievements of the faculty.
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76 Lecturer in Church Polity

At its meeting of January 24<sup>th</sup>, 2008, the Board approved a proposal from the Senate to reappoint Rev. J. de Gelder as instructor in Church Polity for a period of three years, a period going to the end of the 2010-2011 academic year. The Board is very appreciative of the willingness of both Rev. de Gelder and the Consistory of the Church at Flamborough to help the College in this way.

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84 Tenure

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Dr. Visscher has served as Professor of New Testament since June 1, 2001 while Dr. de
 Visser has served as Professor of Diaconiology and Ecclesiology since June 1, 2004. Both
 professors have demonstrated a commitment to excellence in teaching and research and

have so earned the respect of colleagues and students. They meet the requirements for

Tanung as set forth by Sunod Abbetsford 1005. Art, 07. The Board is therefore asking

90 Tenure as set forth by Synod Abbotsford 1995, Art. 97. The Board is therefore asking

- Synod 2010 to approve granting of tenure to these professors.
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#### 93 Principalship

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In accordance with the decisions of Synod 2004, Dr. G.H. Visscher was scheduled to take
 over the Principalship in September, 2008. Due to the poor health of Dr. N.H. Gootjes,

97 Dr. Visscher took over the principalship already in 2007. The Principalship of Dr. G.H.

98 Visscher is scheduled to end in 2011. Under the rotating principalship concept, Dr. A.J. de

99 Visser is in line to become the next Principal. However, Dr. de Visser is of the view that

his current workload does not allow for these added responsibilities transition; in addition,
he does not believe he is the right man for this task. The Board has accepted Dr. de

102 Visser's current position on this matter. Since the remaining faculty is either new or

retiring, the Board determined that it would be best to reappoint Dr. Visscher as Principal for the period from 2011 to 2014.

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106 *Course work* 

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The Board can report that despite several challenges, the work of the Theological College has continued without interruption since the last General Synod. Each September, the Board received an extensive report from the Senate about the work of the previous academic year. These reports indicate that all courses were taught and that the adopted curriculum was fully implemented. In addition, each spring and fall, a team of two Board members visited the lectures for two days and provided a comprehensive report to the Board. These reports indicate that the instruction provided by the faculty is fully

115 Scriptural, in accord with the confessions of the churches, and is academically challenging.

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117 Visits to the Churches by faculty members

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Dr. N.H. Gootjes visited the churches in British Columbia from April 30 to May 3, 2007. 119 He spoke in various places on the topic of the frequency of celebrating the Lord's Supper. 120 Attendance at the speeches was quite good. In April of 2008, Dr. G.H. Visscher was able 121 to visit with the churches in Manitoba. He spoke in both Winnipeg and Carman on the 122 topic of "Forgiveness and Reconciliation." Again, attendance was good at these meetings. 123 In August of 2008, Dr. Visscher visited the American Reformed Church at Denver, CO 124 and gave an adapted version of the same speech presented earlier in Manitoba. Apart from 125 these official trips on behalf of the College, faculty members are regularly invited to make 126 presentations on various topics among the churches. During the last three years, Dr. De 127 Visser has given presentations on evangelism in various places while Dr. Visscher spoke in 128 the Fraser Valley of British Columbia on "The New Perspective on Paul" and "Federal 129 Vision." The Board and the Senate are confident that these visits to the churches by faculty 130 members serve the positive purpose of promoting good relations and awareness of the 131 College as well as making connections with prospective students. 132

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134 Department of Dogmatology

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In the fall of 2007, the Board for the first time became aware that Dr. Gootjes was dealing
with significant health issues relating to the functioning of his memory. At its meeting of
January 24, 2008, the Board decided to grant Dr. Gootjes a sabbatical for Semester I of the
2008-2009 academic year. At the same meeting, the Board decided to appoint Prof. Dr.

J.W. Maris of Apeldoorn, the Netherlands, as a temporary instructor in dogmatology for
 Semester I of the 2008-2009 academic year, provided that he would be willing to sign the

142 Subscription Form (adapted to reflect his status as a non-faculty member).

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Before the sabbatical of Dr. Gootjes came into effect, however, it became evident that he
would not be able to finish his work for the 2007-2008 academic year. On March 25, 2008,
the Board approved a recommendation from the Senate to relieve Dr. Gootjes of his
teaching duties for the balance of the 2007-2008 academic year due to continuing memory
problems. At the same time, the Board approved the proposal of the Senate to appoint Rev.
P. Feenstra to teach Dogmatics 2409, Rev. E. Kampen to teach Symbolics 2410 and to
accept the offer of Prof. J. Geertsema to teach Symbolics 1409.

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152 At the meeting of April 21, 2008, it became clear to the Board that the health of Dr.

153 Gootjes was not improving and the decision was made to place him on indefinite sick

154 leave. This decision was taken in consultation with Dr. and Mrs. Gootjes and with their

155 full agreement. At the same meeting, the Board approved a proposal of the Senate to

appoint Rev. J. VanVliet, minister of the Maranatha Canadian Reformed Church in Surrey,

British Columbia, as a temporary instructor in dogmatology for Semester II of the 2008-

- 158 2009 academic year (January to May 2009).
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At its meeting of December 11, 2008, the Board received information that Dr. Gootjes
was not able to envision a return to his professorial duties at the College by September
2009 nor was he able to anticipate a return beyond that date. The Board therefore decided
that while investigation of his difficulties continued, Dr. Gootjes would remain on

164 indefinite sick leave. At the same meeting, the Board declared a vacancy in the department

of dogmatology. Further, the Board mandated the Senate to provide recommendations for

temporary instructor (s) to replace Dr. Gootjes for the 2009-2010 academic year. The

decision to declare a vacancy and to seek a replacement for Dr. Gootjes was made with the

168 full knowledge and agreement of Dr. and Mrs. Gootjes.169

At the meeting of January 29, 2009, the Board adopted a proposal of the Senate to appoint Rev. J. VanVliet as temporary instructor in dogmatology for the 2009-2010 academic year. The Board considered the possibility of asking for an early Synod in order to seek approval to appoint Rev. VanVliet as Professor of Dogmatology but decided not to do so on the

to appoint Rev. VanVliet as Professor of Dogmatology but decided not to do so on the
 grounds that there was not sufficient time to allow for an appointment to be in place by

- 175 September 2010.
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Also at its meeting of January 29<sup>th</sup>, the Board decided to seek approval from Synod 2010 to
appoint Rev. J. Vanvliet as Professor of Dogmatology. In a separate submission to this
Synod to be provided at a later date, the Board will provide a comprehensive proposal to
this effect.

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On February 23, 2009, the Board received a letter of acceptance from Rev. VanVliet for
his appointment as temporary instructor in dogmatology for the 2009-2010 academic year.
In this way, the Lord has made it possible for the work of the College to continue without
interruption.

The appointment of Dr. Maris was questioned by several of the churches on the grounds
that he is not a member of our churches or of a church with which the Can. Ref. Churches
have ecclesiastical fellowship.

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In its original letter (dated March 4, 2008) informing the churches of the appointment of Dr. Maris, the Board indicated that while it "would have strongly preferred to find a person from within our own federation or from among one of our sister churches, this proved to be not possible at this time." At the same time, the Board stated that Dr. Maris was well-qualified to teach Reformed dogmatics and that he was well appreciated in the Theological University of our sister churches where he has taught on various occasions.

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198 In a follow up letter to the churches (dated May 6, 2008), the Board indicated that in 199 appointing Dr. Maris as "temporary instructor," it had worked with the assumption that there was no requirement for non-faculty, temporary instructors to be members of the 200 201 Canadian Reformed Churches or one of their sister churches. The same assumption has been operative on many occasions in the past when guest lecturers or short term, temporary 202 instructors were appointed to speak or instruct at the College. For procedural and 203 204 governance purposes, these individuals have never been considered part of the Faculty and they are not able to avail themselves of the regular rights and role of being a member of the 205 Faculty. 206

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Because of the concerns of the churches, the Board engaged in closer scrutiny of the 208 209 College Act and the By-laws. Through this exercise, it became apparent that both the wellestablished past practice and the recent appointment of Dr. Maris do not conform to the 210 current operating By-law. The Board now realizes that the incorporating statute (the 211 College Act which created the College) includes "instructors" as "Faculty, whereas By-212 law 12 goes on to include "temporary instructor" as part of the "Faculty." Since all Faculty 213 members are required to be members of the Canadian Reformed Churches or their sister 214 churches, the churches were correct in pointing out to the Board that the decision to 215 appoint Dr. Maris did not fit with By-law 12. 216

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Despite the realization that the appointment of Dr. Maris did not fit with By-law 12, the 218 Board felt it had no choice but to make a onetime exception to the requirement as stipulated 219 in the by-law, thus allowing the appointment to stand. Before the Board appointed Dr. 220 Maris in January of 2008, the Board looked at home and abroad for scholars who could 221 help us out on short notice, who could do so for a full semester, and who have the academic 222 credentials to teach the required material. Our investigation led us to conclude that no 223 minister (or team of ministers) in our federation or of one of the sister churches was 224 available at that time to fill the vacancy from September to December of 2008. Rev. Van 225 Vliet, whom we had been able to engage for Semester II of the 2008-2009 academic year 226 was not available for Semester I. 227

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In our May 6, 2008 letter to the churches, the Board stated the following: *The study of* 

230 dogmatics is a singular and challenging discipline. As Board, we have an obligation to see

- to it that the program of instruction at the College continues at an appropriate academic
- 232 *level.* We believe and know that Dr. Maris has the appropriate confessional and academic
- credentials to provide faithful and academically responsible education for our students.

His written material is known and has been reviewed and his character, views and
background considered. As Board we are convinced that at this critical moment there is no
other possibility for us to accomplish the goal without a significant diminishment in the
delivery of the academic curriculum.

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As Board, we now ask Synod to judge that under the difficult circumstances surrounding
the department of dogmatology, the appointment of Dr. J. Maris as temporary instructor in
dogmatology was understandable and defensible.

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At the same time, the Board realizes that it needs to work toward greater clarity in the governing documents of the College so that in specific and limited circumstances the College is able to avail itself of the services of speakers and lecturers who do not belong to the supporting churches or sister churches but whose expertise would be beneficial for the program of instruction. Specifically, the Board needs to find a way to harmonize the College Act and By-law 12 in regard to the terms "lecturer," "instructor" and "temporary instructor." We hope to serve the next General Synod with a proposal in this regard.

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- 251 Department of Old Testament
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At the meeting of January 24, 2008, the Board received notice from Dr. C. Van Dam that 253 he intends to retire as Professor of Old Testament upon reaching the age of 65 in the spring 254 of 2011. The Board decided to grant Dr. Van Dam retirement upon the completion of the 255 256 2010-2011 academic year. At its meeting on December 11, 2008, the Board decided to declare a vacancy in the Department of Old Testament effective at the beginning of the 257 2011-2012 academic year. A Search Committee (consisting of three members of the 258 Academic Committee, one member of the Finance and Property Committee as well as the 259 Principal) was appointed and the work began of researching candidates. Input was 260 received from the Senate and many of the churches. In a separate submission to be 261 provided at a later date, the Board will be seeking the approval of Synod 2010 to appoint a 262 new Professor of Old Testament. 263

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In his letter of January 24, 2008, Dr. Van Dam also requested a sabbatical during his last year of teaching. Dr. Van Dam was entitled to this sabbatical following his last term as Principal but did not receive one due to the Board not being able to locate a replacement instructor. Subsequent to January 24, Dr. Van Dam provided a detailed plan of the work which he intends to do during his sabbatical. The Board has granted Dr. VanDam a sabbatical for semester 2A and 2B of the 2010-2011 academic year.

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# 272 Support from Australia

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The bond between the College and the Free Reformed Churches of Australia (FRCA) is reflected not only in the student body but also in the significant financial support received from these churches. Synod 2009 of the FRCA decided to provide support at the level of \$65.00 per communicant member. During the last three years, the Board was also pleased to receive representation from the Deputies for the Training for the Ministry of the FRCA at Board meetings and at the annual Convocation. As another indication of the bond

between the College and the FRCA, Dr. Van Dam has been delegated to represent the 280 College on a speaking tour in Australia in 2010. During the last three years, the Deputies 281 282 of the FRCA have pressed the Board of Governors to investigate possibilities in the area of Distance Learning via the internet. The goal would be to allow Australian students to 283 complete at least their first year of studies at the College via distance learning, utilizing 284 technology available and in development. The position of the Board has so far been that 285 practical obstacles are prohibitive and that in any case, the classic, face to face academic 286 model of interactive education is particularly important in the preparation of pastor. In 287 288 the future, there will likely be more dialogue with the Deputies of the FRCA on this point as it remains a matter they wish to seriously pursue. 289

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291 **Staff** 

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293 Administrative assistant

The Board is grateful for the continued service of Ms. Catharine Mechelse in her administrative role. She fulfills a variety of roles within the functioning of the College and helps to ensure that all facets of the College run smoothly.

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- 299 Librarian
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We are also grateful for the faithful and professional service of our librarian, Ms. Margaret Van der Velde. Each year, the Librarian files a comprehensive Report to the Board about developments and changes in the Library. From these reports, it is abundantly evident that the Library is well-managed and ever responsive to the needs of faculty and students as well to constant changes in technology.

# 307 Student body

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Since the last Synod, nine students have graduated from the College with the Master of 309 Divinity degree while one student received the Diploma of Theological Studies. In 310 September 2007, the Master of Divinity degree was conferred upon Mr. David DeJong, Mr. 311 Dmitri Kiselev and Mr. Jim Witteveen while the Diploma of Theological Studies was 312 awarded to Rev. Jaeman Choi. In September, 2008, three more students received the 313 314 degree of Master of Divinity: Mr. Rolf denHollander, Mr. Stuart Harsevoort and Mr. Cornelis Kleyn. Three more students graduated with a Master of Divinity in September 315 316 2009: Mr. Ken Bergsma, Mr. Ryan DeJonge and Mr. Rodney Vermeulen. At the time of the writing of this report, 16 students were enrolled in the Master of Divinity program 317 while two were in the Diploma of Theological Studies. In addition, there was one full 318 time auditor. Of the M. Div students, 13 were from the Canadian Reformed Churches 319 320 while three came from the Free Reformed Churches of Australia.

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# 322 Finance and Property

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Attached to this Report for inclusion in the *Acts of Synod* are the 2007, 2008 and 2009 Annual Reports of the Finance and Property Committee along with audited (as applicable) Annual Financial Reports for the years 2006, 2007 and 2008. These Reports indicate that the facilities of the College are functioning very well and are being kept in good repair. It is also clear from the Reports that the churches continue to support the College faithfully. Each year the Budget could be met. Mr. H. Salomons, C.A., functions as Auditor at

present. In addition, the Board also acknowledges with thankfulness the generous annualcontributions of the Women's Savings Action.

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# 333 Pastoral Training Program

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Synod 2007 decided that the Pastoral Training Program be kept separate from the College 335 curriculum and that it should become mandatory for all students aspiring to the ministry of 336 the Word among the Canadian Reformed Churches in accordance with the document 337 entitled "Guidelines for the Pastoral Proficiency Program" (Article 78 of the Acts, 338 339 Recommendation 4.10). Synod 2007 also decided to appoint a Funding Committee with authority to assess the churches (Article 78, Recommendation 4.11). The Board can report 340 that the Pastoral Training Program and the new method of funding internships is working 341 342 well. The PTP Coordinator, Dr. A.J. de Visser, has good communication with the Funding Committee appointed by the Church at Guelph. There is good cooperation from 343 the churches in finding placements for the students and the students continue to testify that 344 the benefits for them are considerable. 345

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# 347 Decisions of Synod 2007

349 Article 124, Acts of Synod 2007.

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Article 124 of the Acts of Synod 2007 states: "To mandate the Board of Governors of our Theological College to encourage and aid the FRCSA (Free Reformed Churches of South Africa) in the quest to redesign their Theological Training by serving them with advice, and by extending academic backing through guest lectures, as well as assisting students who may enroll here with the necessary language and social support."

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At its meeting of September 6, 2007, the Board reviewed this decision of Synod. It was noted that the FRCSA had been made aware of this decision of Synod 2007 and that the way was therefore open for them to come to the Board or the Senate with specific requests.

At its meeting of April 21, 2008, the Board received a letter from Dr. Hannes Breytenbach, National Coordinator of the Ministerial Training Structure of the FRCSA. In this letter, Dr. Breytenbach requested an opportunity to meet with representatives of the College in order to discuss how the ministerial training program of the FRCSA might find help in the programs and expertise of the College. The Board decided to leave this matter to the Senate to respond as it sees fit. The secretary of the Board advised Dr. Breytenbach to contact the Senate directly.

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Since that time, there has been significant dialogue between representatives of the FRCSA
and the Senate of the College. The Board therefore considers that it has fulfilled the
directives of Article 124 of the Acts of Synod 2007.

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Having considered these recommendations as well as an evaluation of them by the Review 471 and Accreditation Committee, the Board, in its meeting of September 10, 2009, decided to 472 pursue the appointment of a part-time Chief Administrative Officer who would take on 473 many of the responsibilities of the Registrar, the Dean of Students, the Principal, as well as 474 various aspects of the Pastoral Training Program. The Board also decided that it needed 475 more time to consider many of the recommendations of the external committee including 476 the main recommendation for a fifth faculty member since it is based, in part, on a 477 478 perceived need for additional courses (apologetics, spirituality, counseling and missiology) and an otherwise expanded vision for the College. For this reason, the Board is not ready at 479 this time to make a specific proposal for a fifth professor with a particular department or 480 course load. 481

482

Even though the review and accreditation process initiated by the Board upon the instruction of Synod in 2007 has not yet led to a clear direction and a concrete proposal, the Board remains convinced that a fifth professor would be very beneficial for the future of the College. The Board fully expects that it will be coming to Synod 2013 to seek approval for the appointment of a fifth faculty member. To assist in understanding such perspective and intention, the Board would like to share the main reasons for its conviction that a fifth professor is warranted and desirable:

490

While the teaching load of the faculty has not increased over the last years, the maturing of the College should allow for greater specialization in the work of faculty members. Continuing with the current number of faculty members is possible but not ideal.

- In the past and up to the present, the wide range of subjects taught by faculty
  members made it difficult for them to stay current in all areas of instruction
  assigned to them and to do research.
- Increasing the number of faculty members would enable the professors to develop their research and to give more substantive leadership in contemporary issues. The churches would be well served by men who have time to become true experts in their field of endeavor.
- Use of part time lecturers is not desirable as a long term solution; part-time lecturers
   would in all likelihood be ministers with responsibilities in their own
   congregations; while ministers can help in a crisis, the impact on their own
   workload would be enormous.
- Outside experts (the external committee) from the ARTS have indicated that a fifth
   professor is highly recommended.
- The ATS has already indicated that it expects six professors as a minimum.
- The subject matter of the professor of ecclesiology and diaconiology is too large; 510 he is required to teach many subjects which are not naturally unified as are the

# 557 By-law Number 12

558

559 Since the last Synod, t he Board of Governors has dealt with four matters that required an 560 amendment to By-law Number 12. These changes have been approved by the Board, but 561 since all by-law changes need to be approved by general synod we hereby submit them for 562 approval. They are as follows:

563 564 1. Amendment by way of an addition to section 13.10 of operating by-law no. 12. a. The change is to add as subparagraph (d) to section 13.10 the following: 565 (d) Notwithstanding the provisions of subparagraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this 566 section 13.10, the amount of any pension or other allowance paid to a 567 professor, his wife and to or in respect of any dependants by the 568 *Government of Canada or by any province or municipality or any agency* 569 thereof shall include any and all amounts that would been paid but are not 570 as a result of : 571 i. the net income of the professor, his widow or his dependants, as the 572 case may be, exceeding the threshold amount determined by the tax 573 authorities from time to time whereby such entitlement for any such 574 pension or allowance is not paid, either in whole or in part; or 575 ii. any other action of the professor, his widow or his dependants which 576 is entirely within the control and discretion of such professor, widow 577 or dependants, as the case may be." 578 b. Explanatory Note: The current by-law references a deduction for any 579 pension or other allowance "paid" to a professor, widow or to or in respect 580 of dependants. There are and could be circumstances where a professor, 581 widow or dependants are not actually paid such pension or allowances 582 where the tax filing position and income exceeds the threshold set by 583 Canada Revenue Agency and such pensions or allowances are in effect 584 "clawed back" and not "paid". The rationale for the amendment is that such 585 586 additional income and claw back is driven by the personal circumstances, income and tax filing of the professor, widow or dependants and the College 587 should still receive a "notional" credit for such payments which would 588 otherwise have been paid. 589 c. This change was approved by the Board of Governors in its meeting of 590 January 21, 2008. 591 2. Amendment by way of an addition to section 11.02(b) of operating By-law no. 592 12. 593 a. The change is to add to this section the words "have not reached age 76" so 594 that the amended section will read: Members of the Senate shall remain 595 members as long as they meet one or more of the conditions set out in 596 section 11.02(a), have not reached age 76, and provided they are a member 597 of the faculty in good standing. 598 b. Grounds: 599 Since the Board appoints a retired faculty member to the Senate it i. 600 should also be the Board that determines how long this member 601 should serve. #### Name change 692

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In its meeting of September 10, 2009, the Board adopted a proposal to change the name by 694 which the College operates or is known from "The Theological College of the Canadian 695 Reformed Churches" to "Canadian Reformed Theological Seminary."  698 change. The College would simply operate under a different style or operative name.

The Board felt that the while the current name clearly indicates the connection to the 700 churches, it is rarely used because it is too long and unwieldy; instead of using the full 701 name, people frequently refer to our institution simply as "the Theological College" or as 702 "the Theological College in Hamilton" - names which are too generic and vague. In 703 addition, the Board considered that the current name reflects historical connections to the 704 705 seminary of our sister church in Kampen, the Netherlands ("Theologische School van de Gereformeerde Kerken in Nederland"). However, after forty years the Theological College 706 stands on its own feet and the connections with 'Kampen' are not as strong as they used to 707 be. It is time to consider what kind of name 'works' well in the North American context. 708 709 Advantages of the proposed new name are:

• The identity of the College is clearly indicated by the words "Canadian Reformed."

- The educational character of the College is highlighted with the words "Theological Seminary." The word 'seminary' points to the goal of preparing students for the ministry of the Word. The word 'theological' indicates that we aim to do this at an academic level.
- The length of the name is brought back from seven to four words.
- The character of the name is in line with current North American usage.
- Though modernized and 'Canadianized', the new name retains the essentials of the old name. The Board is confident that the churches will readily embrace the new name.
  - This name is already being used informally.

The Board therefore asks Synod to approve this name change with the understanding that
the legal name of the College will not change since it is embedded in the College Act
which can be changed only by the Legislature of the Province of Ontario.
