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Committee for Contact with Churches in North America **Report to Synod Guelph 2022** November 30, 2021 Beloved brothers in the Lord, We respectfully present our report covering the period since GS 2019 (Edmonton-Immanuel). We do so with thanks to God for His blessing upon the brotherly meetings, discussions, and communications that have occurred during the past three years. We trust that the churches will continue to pray for an increase in the unity of the faith among the churches with whom we enjoy ecclesiastical fellowship or other close relations. The government restrictions experienced in 2020 and 2021 significantly hampered our inter-church relations and so this report is a little thinner than usual. At the same time, we were able to spend extra time on the combined mandate we received from GS 2019 in Article 149. We would like to as yet thank GS 2019 for adopting the recommendation that our General Report be submitted five months in advance of the next synod rather than the usual six months (Article 68, p.61). This proved providential since it allowed us to include in our report the work completed at NAPARC 2021 whereas under the old system we would have had no work to report from either NAPARC 2020 (cancelled) or 2021. A. General Report 1. Introduction 1.1 Committee Members General Synod Edmonton 2019 made the following appointments to the CCCNA: (Acts 2019, p. 167): Subcommittee East: the Rev. D.W. Vandeburgt (2022), G. Bos (2022), the Rev. M. Jagt (convenor) (2025), J. Temple (2025)

Subcommittee West: the Rev. S. Vandevelde (2025), H. van Delden (2022), L. Vanderveen (convenor) (2022), P. Veenendaal (2025)

Recommendation:

 Brs. Bos, Vandeburgt, van Delden and Vanderveen will complete their terms in 2022. Br. Veenendaal was unable to continue in his work on this committee on account of health reasons and left the committee part way through 2021. We recommend that these brothers be discharged from the CCCNA and thanked for their years of service to the churches as members of this committee. We are particularly grateful that brs. Vandeburgt and van Delden

could serve on this committee for 12 years. If General Synod does not adopt the proposal of the CCCNA-CRCA for a newly structured committee it will need to appoint 5 new members to the committee. The CCCNA will be sending a separate letter to GS 2022 with recommendations of who could be appointed to the CCCNA to fill these 5 vacancies.

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1.2 General activity

Plenary meetings of the CCCNA were held on September 6, 2019, April 14, 2020, October 7, 2020, February 10, 2021, April 21, 2021, September 22, 2021 and November 24, 2021. The following brothers functioned as the executive:

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- a. Chairman: Rev. M. Jagt
- b. General Secretary: Rev. D. Vandeburgt
- 109 c. Treasurer: Br. H. van Delden

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The two subcommittees appointed by General Synod were maintained and the following division of labour was agreed upon:

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Subcommittee East: Contact with ARPC, ERQ, FRC, HRC, KPCA and OPC, Subcommittee West: Contact with RCUS, RPCNA, URCNA and NAPARC

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Minutes of the subcommittee meetings were exchanged via email to promote good communication and mutual scrutiny.

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Four members of our committee were delegated to attend NAPARC in 2019 and three members in 2021. During NAPARC these members met with their counterparts. The meetings were as follows:

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- a. ARPC –November 12, 2019; November 11, 2021
- b. ERQ –November 13, 2019;
 - c. FRCNA –November 13, 2019; November 10, 2021
 - d. HRC -November 12, 2019; November 10, 2021
 - e. OPC –November 13, 2019; November 11, 2021
 - f. RCUS –November 12, 2019; November 9, 2021
 - g. RPCNA November 10, 2021
 - h. URCNA November 12, 2019; November 9, 2021

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Two committee members, brs Vandeburgt and van Delden, were assigned to meet with representatives from the CRCA to fulfill the mandate found in Article 149 of General Synod Edmonton. Their work was reviewed and refined by our plenary and has been jointly submitted as a separate report.

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2. General Mandate

General Synod Edmonton 2019 (Acts 2019, p.61) decided to mandate the CCCNA as follows:

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- 141 1. To continue contact with all those churches in North America with which we have 142 Ecclesiastical Fellowship (EF) according to the adopted rules, and in accordance with the 143 mandates described in decisions taken by synod with respect to the churches with which we 144 have ongoing relationships;
 - 2. To investigate diligently all the requests received for entering into EF in North America;
 - 3. To respond, if possible and feasible, to specific requests made to attend assemblies, synods, or meetings of other churches in North America;
 - 4. To report on its findings with suitable recommendations to the next general synod, and to present to the churches a report of its work 5 months prior to the convening of the next general synod.

For the sake of convenience, here follow the rules for Ecclesiastical Fellowship (EF) that the committee applies in fulfilling its mandate. These rules were determined by Synod Lincoln 1992 (*Acts*, p. 33):

- 1. The churches shall assist each other in the maintenance, defence and promotion of the Reformed faith in doctrine, church polity, discipline, and liturgy, and be watchful for deviations.
- 2. The churches shall inform each other of the decisions taken by their broadest assemblies, if possible by sending each other their Acts or Minutes and otherwise, at least by sending the decisions relevant to the respective churches (if possible, in translation).
- 3. The churches shall consult each other when entering into relations with third parties.
- 4. The churches shall accept one another's attestations or certificates of good standing, which also means admitting members of the respective churches to the sacraments upon presentation of that attestation or certificate.
- 5. The churches shall in principle open their pulpits for each other's ministers in agreement with the rules adopted in the respective churches.
- 6. In exercising these relations, the churches shall strive to implement also when major changes or additions are being considered to the confessions, church government or liturgy, the churches shall be informed in order that as much consultation can take place as possible before a final decision is taken.
- 7. The churches shall receive each other's delegates at their broadest assemblies and invite them to participate as much as local regulations permit.

Recommendations:

- 1. We advise Synod to deal first with the CRCA-CCCNA report and, that in the absence of Synod adopting the recommendations of this report, the mandate, as stated by GS 2019, be continued for the CCCNA until 2025.
- 2. We advise that in the case of Synod adopting the recommended 'Rules for Ecumenical Relationships' in the CRCA-CCCNA report that the following churches be considered for 'Category 2: Corresponding Relationship': the ARPC, FRCNA, HRC and RPCNA.

B.1 Report on the CanRC relationship with the Associated Reformed Presbyterian Church

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209 Introduction:

The CanRC does not have EF with the ARPC but is a member of NAPARC together with the ARPC.

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Mandate of GS 2019

- GS 2019 gave the following mandate to the committee in art. 61:
- 4.1 To engage in continued dialogue and contact with the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church (ARPC)
 - 4.2 To submit its report to the churches 5 months prior to the convening of the next general synod.

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Execution of this mandate in the period summer 2019 to fall 2021

2019:

o The committee with the ARPC at NAPARC 2019.

2020:

o There were no meetings with the ARPC in 2020 because of the covid pandemic.

2021:

o The committee met with the ARPC on November 11, 2021.

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Observations:

- We continue to enjoy good fraternal dialogue with the ARPC. Our last GS welcomed Rev. Bill Barron as an observer, and he received the opportunity to bring fraternal greetings on behalf of the ARPC. This occasion was reflected on with thankfulness by the ARPC at our 2019 bi-lateral meeting. The ARPC expressed a desire to once again be invited to our upcoming GS.
- There are about 12 ARPC churches/works in Canada with some ongoing contact at the local level in southern Ontario. As one example, one of our committee members (Rev. Jeff Temple), led worship in an ARPC in Chatham, on October 31, 2021.
- The ongoing internal struggles of the PCA surrounding the topic of 'gay Christians' continue to be watched closely by the ARPC because there is the possibility that some PCA churches will move to the ARPC.
- The ARPC continues to face challenges around the education of their covenant children. Historically, public schools in the southern US are part of the Christian and American identity and so attending them has been something of a matter of patriotic loyalty; however, in recent years there has been a shift to home-schooling in the ARPC.
- Like their closest EF church (the RPCNA) the ARPC has women serving in the diaconate. From a historical and exegetical standpoint, the ARPC has viewed the diaconate as a serving office without authority, rather than a ruling office with authority. Whether women serve in this office in the ARPC is a matter of discretion by the local session. On the whole this practice is in decline in the denomination.

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Recommendations:

The CanRC has a relationship with FRCNA according to their 'level one' category. Please note that the Acts of General Synod 2019 are incorrect on the details of "level one" (Art. 148, 2.7). The CanRC is a member of NAPARC together with the FRCNA.

Mandate of GS 2019

GS 2019 gave the following mandate to the committee in art. 148:

- 4.2.1 To keep the churches with which EF has already been established informed of our relationship with the FRCNA and consult with them concerning the FRCNA.
- 4.1.4 To submit its report to the churches 5 months prior to the convening of the next general synod.

Execution of this mandate in the period summer 2019 to fall 2021

2019:

o The committee met with the FRCNA at NAPARC 2019

2020:

o There were no meetings with the FRCNA in 2020 because of the covid pandemic.

2021:

- Two committee members attended the FRCNA synod in September 2021.
- o The committee met with the FRCNA at NAPARC 2021.

Observations

- We are thankful to have been warmly welcomed at their most recent Synod and that we could have the privilege of bringing fraternal greetings.
- We continue to be encouraged by developing relationships at a local level in both the Fraser Valley and southern Ontario, including the acceptance by one of our committee members (Rev. Jeff Temple) of an invitation to preach in an FRCNA church on May 30, 2021.
- At NAPARC 2019 the FRCNA provided our committee with some documents and articles to peruse. This material largely focused on the appropriation of salvation and the relationship between Word and Spirit.
- In 2021 we provided a written response that first outlined the history of our relationship with the FRCNA and then provided a variety of confessional statements in order to form a bridge between us.
- The various materials shared led to a robust discussion at our bi-lateral meeting at NAPARC 2021 on such topics as: the varied nature of the people of God, the universal call for all to repent and believe; the objective nature of the covenant, and the very real assurance of salvation that children of God are privileged to know. Moreover, we discussed whether the differences in our preaching were merely a matter of style and emphasis or whether it arose from a fundamentally different perspective on the people of God.
- The FRCNA and the HRC continue to work on merging their federations. Among other matters, the language of the confessions, liturgical forms, a common church order, rules for ecclesiastical

- fellowship and a blended Psalter are being worked on.¹
 - The FRCNA expresses its appreciation for the discussions we have had over the past three years as well its desire to continue to talk with us more often, and not just at the annual meeting of NAPARC.

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Recommendations

The CCCNA recommends that synod decide:

- 1. To mandate the committee to
 - 1.1 To engage in continued dialogue and contact with the FRCNA.

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History of the relationship

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The CanRC and the FRCNA had an active working relationship with one another at the federative level for the period 1998-2008 (see decisions below). This relationship broke down towards the end of that period. In 2007 the CanRC, in response to certain concerns of the FRCNA, chose to cease pursuing discussions with the FRCNA until such time as they requested resumption of contact. There was a brief resumption of contact at NAPARC in 2008 and then a resumption of regular contact beginning in 2017.

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General Synod Decisions Relating to the FRCNA

- The committee met with the HRC at NAPARC 2019.

2020:

The committee had no meetings with the HRC during 2020 because of the covid pandemic

2021:

o The committee met with the HRC at NAPARC 2021.

Observations

- The 2020 Synod of the HRC decided to enter into Level 2 with the Canadian Reformed Churches. We are thankful for this as it provides further opportunity to work towards EF with this church. Our assessment is that at this time we cannot recommend EF with the HRC as they would not be able to entertain such a possibility at this time. They have yet another level between their Level 2 (Formal Correspondence) and their Level 4 (Full Fellowship). In addition, there is a minimum 2-year period before the HRC would consider entering into their Level 3 (Limited Fellowship).
- The HRC continues to work towards organic unity with the FRCNA.² In connection with that, the HRC indicates that it would be wise and beneficial for us to meet with them and the FRCNA at the same time given the growing closeness of their two churches.
- The HRC has expressed to us their appreciation for the individual and institutional collaboration between PRTS and CRTS.
- On the International scene our paths cross with the HRC in Indonesia (HRC has a foreign mission work in Sumba), and the Netherlands (HRC has been in dialogue with the Hersteld Hervormde Kerk).

HERITAGE REFORMED CONGREGATIONS

Descriptions of Levels of Ecclesiastical Fellowship As amended by Synod 2014

Level 1: Informal Contact

- 1. This informal level allows relationships to develop with like-minded churches or denominations without requiring a formal tie. This level includes only informal communication with various churches and denominations around us, both in our local community as well as beyond.
- 2. There is no obligation or commitment except for us to witness the Reformed Biblical truth to them.
- 3. Meetings with their representatives are to be held by the Church Correspondence Committee in order to determine if there is sufficient ground to bring a request before Synod that this denomination/congregation ought to be considered eligible to move to the second level of correspondence. Synod must approve of this request before any other level of correspondence can be carried out. These meetings would seek to determine the doctrinal position of the denomination or congregation and whether or not they uphold the Three Forms of Unity and/or the Westminster Standards.

Level 2: Formal Correspondence

- 1. A church and/or denomination would need to direct its committee representatives to verbally assent to the Formula for Public Declaration of Agreement with the Three Forms of Unity and/or Westminster Standards in behalf their broadest assembly.
- 2. Copies of the official minutes, without confidential material, of the broadest assemblies are to be sent to each other. A copy of each issue of the official denominational publication is to be sent to one another's consistory members.
- 3. Representatives of both denominations would continue to meet to determine whether the next level of communication is attainable and desirable and if so, the Church Correspondence Committee would forward this request on to Synod for approval.
- 4. This is done with the understanding that this level of "Formal Correspondence" must be in place for a minimum of two years before the next level of communication would be considered.

Level 3: Limited Fellowship

At this level, there is a formal acknowledgment that the gifts found in each other's churches can be employed in the churches/denominations for the spiritual building up of the kingdom of God. This level would include everything under "Formal Correspondence" and the following:

- 1. Each individual consistory of the HRC would be free to invite any minister from those denomination(s)/congregation(s) [which have been given classis approval to attain Level 3 correspondence] to preach in their pulpits.
- 2. Each individual consistory of the HRC would be free to allow any member from these denomination(s) or /congregation(s) [which have been given synodical approval to attain Level 3 correspondence] to attend the Lord's Supper.

3. Mutual agreement is made with the corresponding denomination/congregation, that delegates would be sent to one another's broadest assemblies as advisory members only. This Level of Fellowship may be revoked at any time by Synod.

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Level 4: Full Fellowship

- 1. At this level the realization of Christ's prayer is more fully evidenced.
- 2. This level includes everything under "Limited Fellowship" as well as:
 - a. Ministers would be considered having full ministerial rights in either federation
 - b. Ministers would be callable from any congregation in either federation without further examination.
 - 3. This full fellowship could include various considerations or stipulations made by both federations in order to arrive at this level. These would mutually be agreed upon by both federations and must not hinder the professed unity expressed.
 - 4. At this point, such fellowship is permanent. This would mean that if either a congregation or the federation departs from the word of God, the recourse is to appeal to the broadest assembly. If no reconciliation is made, sadly, separation must then take place on the basis of the Word of God.

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Level 5: Full Union

Full union means that a complete amalgamation of two federation of churches has taken place. Such amalgamation will only be proposed after

- 1. These federations have functioned harmoniously and efficiently at level 4 for a reasonable period of time
- 2. Be the result of the Synods of both federations having approved of this by a 2/3 majority
- 3. Constitute a new denomination with a previously agreed upon:
 - a. Set of doctrinal standards
 - b. Church order
 - c. Ecclesiastical structure (e.g. Classes, Regional Synods, Synods)
- 4. Be the fullest realization of Christ's prayer that His people be one as He and His Father are one.

- The KPCA (Kosin) is a daughter church of the Presbyterian Church in Korea (Kosin) with whom the Canadian Reformed Churches have had EF since 1992. The KPCA (Kosin) was started in 1985 by
- the Kosin Korean immigrant community in the United States. Contact between the CanRC and the
- 590 KPCA (Kosin) was attempted by the CCCA (under synod mandate) in the early 2000's but, due

largely to the language barrier, bore little fruit and formal attempts were discontinued by Synod Smithers 2007 (see below). After that time some informal acquaintance with the KPCA (Kosin) began to emerge at NAPARC meetings. This informal acquaintance culminated with an invitation to attend their 30th General Assembly in 2014. Thereafter, we held two bi-lateral meetings with their inter-church relations committee at NAPARC 2014 and 2015.

- 4.2.2 To encourage neighbouring classes to interact with the new presbytery in Canada when it is formed;
- 4.2.3 To submit its report to the churches 5 months prior to the convening of the next general synod.

Execution of this mandate in the period summer 2019 to fall 2021

2019:

o The committee met with the OPC at NAPARC 2019.

2020:

• There were no meetings in 2020 due to the covid pandemic

2021:

- The committee sent a letter of fraternal greeting to the 87th General Assembly of the OPC which met July 7-14, 2021.
- o The committee met with the OPC at NAPARC 2021.

Observations

- Our relationship with the OPC continues to be our longest standing relationship in North America. It is unfortunate that we have not been able to attend one of their general assemblies since 2018. With our practice of attending alternate years coupled with travel restrictions and cancellations our relationship during this time was not as intense as it normally is. We are thankful to have met during NAPARC 2021.
- The 87th General Assembly, the chairman of Committee on Ecumenicity and Interchurch Relations, Dr. Anthony Curto, began his report with a moving tribute to long-time committee member, Rev. Jack Sawyer, who went to be with the Lord shortly after GS 2019. Rev. Sawyer was a dear friend to the CCCNA and the Canadian Reformed Churches and will be sadly missed.
- The CEIR recommended that at the next meeting of ICRC a motion be put forward to "terminate the membership of the RCN in the ICRC."³
- We were able to express great appreciation to the OPC for being able to make use of their model of church relations in our CRCA-CCCNA report to GS 2022.
- Much of our recent conversations with the OPC have focused on the work of missions. They shared that they have "the fields and the funds, but they need the fellows". Thanks was also given at the NAPARC 2021 bi-lateral meeting for the Lord sparing the lives of James and Esther Folkerts (OPC missionaries) and Andrew and Inge Pol (minister emeritus of Carman-West

- As with our conversations with other Presbyterian churches as NAPARC 2021 the OPC expressed concerns about the internal struggles of the PCA.

Recommendations

History of the relationship

The OPC made it on to the radar of the CanRC at Synod Hamilton, 1962 via a proposal made by the Regional Synod held in Chatham in 1961. This initial proposal was to seek contact with the OPC. While this proposal was turned down, it resurfaced in 1962 and was accepted at Synod Edmonton 1965. Over time the relationship that developed marked two major milestones. At Synod Coaldale 1977 the CanRC recognized the OPC as a true church of the Lord Jesus Christ and at Synod Neerlandia 2001 the CanRC established EF with the OPC. Since that time the Head of the Church has blessed the bond between the CanRC and OPC.

Introduction

The CanRC entered into EF with the ERQ by a decision of GS 2007 (art. 75) and is a member of NAPARC together with the ERQ.

Mandate of GS 2019

- GS 2019 mandated the committee with respect to the ERQ as follows in Art. 22:
 - 4.3.1 To maintain contact with the ERQ according to the adopted rules;
 - 4.3.2 To submit its report to the churches 5 months prior to the convening of the next general synod.

Execution of this mandate in the period summer 2019 to fall 2021 2019:

- o The committee sent delegates in person to the February and November synode meetings.
- o The committee held an informal meeting with the ERQ delegate at NAPARC 2019.

2020:

o The committee had a delegate attend synode virtually in November 2020.

2021:

- o The committee had a delegate attend synode virtually in June 2021.
- o The ERQ was unable to attend NAPARC 2021 and so no formal bi-lateral meeting has taken place in the past three years.

Observations

- ERQ holds its broadest assembly, the synode, typically three times annually. As a rule, the CanRC are invited, and a delegate will attempt to attend in person once per calendar year. The committee typically sends written greetings when not in attendance. Because of pandemic restrictions, several instances of the synode were held virtually, allowing more frequent attendance, albeit through video-conferencing.
- The relationship has been brotherly, and mutually encouraging. The ERQ appreciates the ongoing contributions from the CanRC both in terms of human as well as financial resources.
- After more than five years of vacancy, South Shore Reformed Church in Charny and the entire ERQ was able to celebrate the ordination and installation of Blaise Tsabang on Sunday August 29, 2021. The congregation and synodical delegates expressed their great joy and thankfulness to God on this special occasion.

Recommendations

The CCCNA recommends that synod decide:

- 1. To continue the relationship of Ecclesiastical Fellowship (EF) with the ERQ under the adopted rules;
- 2. To encourage the churches to support the ERQ prayerfully and financially in their missionary endeavours and special projects.

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History of the relationship

The relationship between the CanRC and the ERQ was initially based on contact with the Church of Ottawa, who in 1994 presented a detailed proposal to GS Abbotsford, 1995. Investigations and decisions at subsequent synods resulted in a decision to enter into EF at Synod 2007.

The EF relationship has been a positive one, with regular contact, support for specific ERQ projects, including translation work, short term mission trips for CanRC youth to English Language camps for Quebecois youth, invitations to special events, and pulpit exchange opportunities.

2020:

There were no in-person meetings in 2020 due to the covid pandemic.

2021:

- o The committee delegated a member to attend the 275th GS of the RCUS in Sioux Falls, IA from May 17-20, 2021.
- o The committee met with the RCUS at NAPARC.

Observations:

- The RCUS has singled out and very much appreciates the developing relationship with the Canadian Reformed Churches. They especially appreciate having fraternal delegates attend for a significant portion of the meeting at both the classis and the synod level meetings.
- Opportunities exist to work together on foreign mission projects, especially in the Philippines.
- Discussions have taken place, and will continue at opportune times, on differing church polity or practices. The important determination is to remain a faithful church within the confines of Scripture and confessions allowing for a unity in the faith with a diversity of practice.
- Based on the rules for EF, the CanRC and the RCUS can effectively assist each other via pulpit exchanges, visiting RCUS churches, participating in youth camps/conferences held by the various churches, and the exchange of articles in magazines supported by church members.
- The matter of women's voting for officer bearers has been raised at recent Synods of the RCUS. A committee in 2020-2021 presented a substantial report against women's voting, however it did not receive enough support to be adopted by Synod. The RCUS Constitution already grants freedom to the local churches on this matter.
- The RCUS have noted that there is some lack of clarity regarding the status of certain position papers which though published some time ago were never adopted by Synod. They point out that one must determine from the Minutes of Synod if a paper in circulation was adopted.

Recommendations:

The CCCNA recommends that synod decide:

- 1. To continue EF with the Reformed Church in the Unites States (RCUS) under the adopted rules.
- 2. To mandate the committee to submit its report to the churches five months prior to the convening of the next general synod.

Brief description of the Reformed Church in the United States

The present-day Reformed Church in the United States (RCUS) is the continuing remnant of the German immigrant denomination of the same name which was founded in 1725 by the Rev. John Philip Boehm. The old RCUS continued as a separate denomination until 1933-34 when the larger part of it united with the Evangelical Synod of North America to form the Evangelical and Reformed Church. This new church merged with the Congregational Christian Churches in 1957 to form the United Church of Christ.

One classis - the Eureka Classis - refused to participate in the 1934 merger. This classis continued as a separate entity for the next five decades. During this time, several congregations of like mind have become part of it. The North Dakota Classis dissolved in 1936 and its ministers and churches joined the Eureka Classis. During the 1950s, congregations at Menno, SD; Manitowoc, WI; Garner, IA; Sutton, NE; and Shafter and Bakersfield, CA, which had either left the Evangelical and Reformed Church or had been independent, joined the Eureka Classis. The 1970s welcomed the arrival of several churches from the General Association of Regular Baptists that had become Reformed. In subsequent years, several groups (some as whole congregations) have left the UCC to join the RCUS. Today, the RCUS numbers about forty congregations.

At its annual meeting in 1986, the Eureka Classis dissolved to form the Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States. Today, instead of one classis, the RCUS consists of four classes: Covenant East, Northern Plains, South Central and Western. Source: www.rcus.org

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History of the relationship

The Canadian Reformed Church in Carman had local contact with the RCUS beginning in 1986. This contact was taken over by the General Synod's CRCA (Committee for Relations with Churches Abroad) in 1992. General Synod Neerlandia 2001 extended EF to the RCUS.

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General Synod Decisions Relating to the RCUS

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Acts of Synod 1989, Article 45

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The first mention of the RCUS can be found where the chairman extends a special welcome to Rev. S. Allison but "as a private visitor ... as there are, as yet, no official contacts between us and the RCUS."

Acts of Synod 1992, Article 79

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The CRCA is mandated to investigate the RCUS with a view to entering into a relationship of EF, making use of the findings of the church at Carman, MB.

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Acts of Synod 1995, Article 101

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The CRCA reported that it had not completed its mandate so GS instructed the CRCA to continue the mandate regarding the RCUS initially given to it by GS 1992.

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RCUS 251st Synod, 1997

2019:

o Members of the CCCNA met with the RPCNA for a bi-lateral meeting on November 10, 2021 at NAPARC.

Observations:

- The CCCNA has twice recommended to a General Synod that EF be extended to the RPCNA (2013, 2016). The recommendation was not adopted at GS 2016 because of two issues. The first is their practice and exegetical defense of ordaining female deacons. The second issue is reservations about the place and function of *The Testimony* (GS 2016, Art. 90, Consideration 3.2, 3.3, 3.5).
- GS 2016 did acknowledge that the RPCNA can be recognized for their faithfulness to the Word of God and their strong Reformed convictions (GS 2016, Art. 90, Consideration 3.5, Recommendation 4.1). We continue to rejoice in the faithfulness of the RPCNA and their strong defense of Reformed faith and practice.
- The RPCNA have congregations or preaching points geographically close to CanRC churches in Ottawa, Elora, Fergus, Guelph and Denver. Several of these have expressed a desire for progression towards unity.
- We observe from their 2021 GS the following:
 - The RPCNA confirmed a special resolution presented by six Canadian congregations petitioning to become a distinct Reformed Presbyterian Church denomination in Canada. It is anticipated that in the summer of 2022 the Reformed Presbyterian Church of Canada will be formed.
 - In response to a Presbytery seeking a precise definition of 'departing' in 1 Corinthians 7 and its relation to scriptural doctrine on divorce the synod clarified its position, 'that desertion as described in 1 Corinthians 7, is a wilful, irremediable, physical departure of

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one spouse from another or irremediably caused by one spouse or the other in accord with Westminster Confession of Faith 24.6'.

The denomination's stance on creation was clarified with a special resolution declaring that 'belief in the literal parentage of Adam and Eve as our first parents is an essential point of the Christian system of doctrine.'

Recommendations:

The CCCNA recommends that Synod decide to mandate the committee:

- 1. To engage in continued dialogue and contact with the Reformed Prebsyterian Church in North America (RPCNA), particularly at NAPARC, and, when appropriate, to discuss the matters that hinder EF with them;
- 2. To take up dialogue and contact with the new Reformed Presbyterian Church of Canada once it is formed and if needed, be permitted to be one of the sponsoring churches for their membership in NAPARC.
- 3. To submit its report to the churches five months prior to the convening of the next general synod.

Brief description of the RPCNA

The RPCNA was established in North America in 1798, having come from the Reformed Presbyterians in Scotland who originated from the Presbyterian Church of Scotland. The RPCNA is a member both of the ICRC and NAPARC. It has formal fraternal relations (EF) with a number of churches, including these sister churches of the CanRC: Free Church of Scotland (Synod of North America); OPC; RCUS and the URCNA. Its Synod meets annually, the most recent one having been held June 14-17, 2021. Further information about the RPCNA may be obtained by visiting its website: www.reformedpresbyterianchurch.org.

1079 General Synod Decisions Relating to the RPCNA

Acts of Synod 2007, Article 163

The first report giving a detailed overview of the RPCNA was submitted to Synod (Reports Vol 1, p.196-239).

Acts of Synod 2010, Article 77

An investigative report regarding *The Testimony*, women deacons, and exclusive psalmody was submitted to Synod (Reports Vol 1, p.188-222). The committee had recommended inviting the RPCNA to enter into ecclesiastical fellowship. Synod decided not to enter into EF with the RPCNA at that time.

Acts of Synod 2013, Article 76

The CCCNA submitted a much shorter report to Synod along the same lines. (Reports Vol 1, p.193-194). Synod instructed the CCCNA to further investigate the matters of deacons' ordination, and *The Testimony*.

Acts of Synod 2016, Article 90

The CCCNA investigated in detail (Observation 2.2, 2.3) the matters of ordained women deacons and *The Testimony* and states that there is nothing to be gained by mandating the committee to study the matters further. It recommended inviting the RPCNA to enter into EF. Synod decided not to enter into EF but did mandate the committee to continue its interaction with the RPCNA.

- o Representatives of the committee met with CERCU on November 9th, 2021 at NAPARC.

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Note: The URCNA have cancelled their General Synods of 2020 and 2021 because of the covid pandemic. Their next Synod is scheduled for June 2022.

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Observations

- At its inaugural meeting in 2019 the CCCNA and CERCU used the time to become acquainted with each other, this being our first meeting following the mandate of Synod Edmonton. The CERCU reiterated their commitment of working towards greater unity and expressing that unity in concrete ways. Expressions of unity have and continue to include: pulpit exchange, concurring Classes and cooperative mission projects.
- At the grassroots level unity is frequently expressed by marriage among each other's members, as well as attending each other's denominational schools. Our committees also recognized that moving towards greater unity requires further grassroots movement. Such a movement requires contact and trust. Geographical and cultural challenges, also within the URCNA itself, continue to be something of a hindrance. Many URCNA churches have little if any contact or familiarity with CanRC churches. Some suggestions were made of how we might overcome some of these challenges.
- Our committees took the opportunity to highlight their respective mandates. The CERCU, presently in phase 2 with the CanRC, continues to follow their mandate, the intent of this phase being recognition and acceptance of each other as faithful churches of our Lord Jesus Christ. The "hold" adopted by Synod Wyoming 2016 is not the end of moving forward in federative unity, but during this time (of at least 6 years) there remains opportunity for one or

- more of the URCNA churches to suggest ways to move forward in our relationship. While consideration 3.1 of our GS 2019 respects the "breather" in unity talks consideration 3.3 expresses that the CanRC remain committed to the pursuit of unity and 'are looking forward to reengaging in this discussion when the URCNA is ready.' Consequently, we could inform them of our mandate 'To encourage the churches to continue to foster relationships with local URCNA churches. These activities could include, but are not limited to, pulpit exchanges, joint community and mission projects, and study opportunities.'

 Letters shared in March and May of 2021 highlighted the continuation of our commitment to
 - Letters shared in March and May of 2021 highlighted the continuation of our commitment to fulfilling our Synodical mandates. CERCU is sending a survey to their churches seeking a response to concerns (theological, church-polity, historical-cultural) they may have regarding organic unity.
 - Since there is a substantial amount of interaction among our respective Classes and local churches, the CCCNA plans to reach out to the CanRC Classes and churches to get a better idea of all that is presently happening between local CanRC and URCNA churches. This will allow us to fulfill mandate 4.7.2, namely, to encourage the churches to foster local relationships.
 - At their meeting at NAPARC 2021 the committees continued discussions on the matters highlighted above.

Recommendations

CCCNA recommends that Synod decide:

- 1. To continue EF with the URCNA according to the adopted rules.
- 2. To encourage the churches to continue to foster relationships with local URCNA churches. These activities could include, but are not limited to, pulpit exchanges, joint community and mission projects, and study opportunities.
- 3. To submit its report to the churches 5 months prior to the convening of the next general synod.

Brief description of the URCNA

The URCNA was established in North America in 1996, largely made up of churches/members who had left the Christian Reformed Church. The URCNA is a member both of the ICRC and NAPARC.

C. NAPARC Report

Introduction

NAPARC is a fellowship of thirteen church denominations based on subscription and adherence to the Bible as summarized in the Three Forms of Unity and the Westminster Confessional Standards. Its purpose is to facilitate discussion on common issues, to study matters of shared concern, to exercise the promotion of the Reformed faith, and to promote collaboration, where feasible, in works of mission, relief, etc. Furthermore, out of a concern to build the Church of Jesus Christ rather than our own denominations and to avoid the appearance of competition the member churches have affirmed a courteous code of behaviour to guide their church planting ministries. This code of behaviour is knowing as the 'Golden Rule' Comity Agreement. Lastly, any decisions of NAPARC are advisory only, and do not affect the autonomy of member churches.

The CanRC has been a member of NAPARC since 2008. For further information (on constitution and bylaws, meetings, supporting materials, etc.) see the website: www.naparc.org.

Mandate of GS 2019 (Art. 105)

GS 2019 gave the following mandate to the CCCNA:

- 4.2 To continue to represent the CanRC at NAPARC and to continue its active involvement in it;
- 4.3 To submit its report to the churches 5 months prior to the convening of the next general synod.

Execution of this mandate in the period summer 2019 to fall 2021

The committee participated in the annual meetings held each November in 2019 (hosted by the KPCA (Kosin) in Anaheim, CA) and in 2021 (hosted by the OPC in Raleigh, NC). The annual meeting of 2020 was cancelled due to the covid pandemic. Four delegates were sent to the meeting in 2019 while three members attended the 2021 meeting. The main agenda items included reports from each of the member church on its synods or general assemblies, significant decisions, and concerns of a theological or practical nature. Discussion and prayer follow each federation's report. The delegates of NAPARC also gather each evening. The first evening the host church leads a worship service and on the second evening a formal dinner is held followed by a keynote address.

Currently there are no church denominations applying for membership in NAPARC. Two denominations have remained as guests for many years: The Bible Presbyterian Church and the Protestant Reformed Church. These churches provide a report on life in their churches on the floor of NAPARC.

Observations

The CCCNA continues to see the benefit of being involved in NAPARC, both to derive insights from and to contribute to the Reformed witness it offers on the North American scene. It is an excellent venue to experience the richness we share as Reformed and Presbyterian brothers. As member churches we live in a North American society that is increasingly secular and hostile. It is good to support one another and maintain a united front on the major challenges we face. Reports from member churches are often relevant to developments or projects of the CanRC, and it is useful to discuss these

matters of shared interest.

NAPARC is also the venue that the CCCNA uses to hold meetings with the Inter-Church relations Committees of the ERQ, OPC, RCUS, RPCNA, HRC, FRCNA, ARP and the URCNA. We also seek to meet with the KPCA (Kosin) triennially.

The committee observes that meetings of NAPARC are an efficient and economical way to encourage and grow the bonds with member churches with whom we have EF.

Considerations

The committee considers that it has sufficiently fulfilled its mandate received from Synod Edmonton 2019. The challenges we all faced as churches considering the global pandemic has slowed our interaction over the three-year period since Synod 2019. The CCCNA remains open and willing to assist the local churches in regard to NAPARC issues.

Recommendations

The Committee recommends that in the absence of Synod adopting the proposal of the CCCNA-CRCA, Synod decide

- to mandate the CCCNA to continue to represent the CanRC at NAPARC and to continue its active involvement in it.
- that the CCCNA submit its report to the churches five months prior to the convening of the next General Synod.

Brief description of NAPARC

Basis:

Confessing Jesus Christ as only Savior and Sovereign Lord over all of life, we affirm the basis of the fellowship of Presbyterian and Reformed Churches to be full commitment to the Bible in its entirety as the Word of God written, without error in all its parts and to its teaching as set forth in the Heidelberg Catechism, the Belgic Confession, the Canons of Dort, the Westminster Confession of Faith, and the Westminster Larger and Shorter Catechisms. That the adopted basis of fellowship be regarded as warrant for the establishment of a formal relationship of the nature of the council, that is, a fellowship that enables the constituent churches to advise, council, and cooperate in various matters with one another and hold out before each other the desirability and need for organic union of churches that are of like faith and practice.

Purpose and Function:

- 1. Facilitate discussion and consultation between member bodies on those issues and problems which divide them as well as on those which they face in common and by the sharing of insights "communicate advantages to one another" (*Institutes* IV, 2, 1).
- 2. Promote the appointment of joint committees to study matters of common interest and concern.
- 3. Exercise mutual concern in the perpetuation, retention, and propagation of the Reformed faith.
- 4. Promote cooperation wherever possible and feasible on the local and denominational level in such areas as missions, relief efforts, Christian schools, and church education.

Nature and Extent of Authority

1310 It is understood that all actions and decisions taken are advisory in character and in no way curtail or restrict the autonomy of the member bodies.
